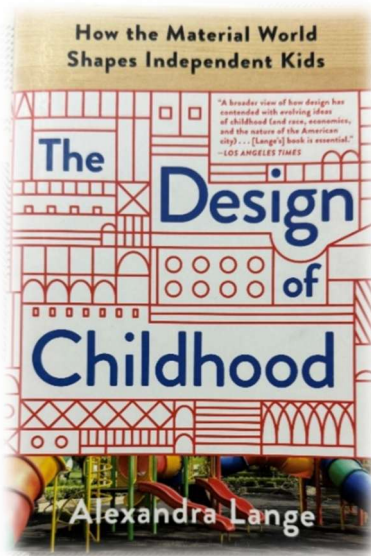


Book Review
